How different would this be if we had PR? People vote tactically against those they don't want, so people like the Greens and Respect will have lost votes to the bigger parties.

Note: 37 parties reported donations late... that's a lot of parties who get donations, and presumably some votes, but don't get any recognition.

## **Voting System**

London Mayoral elections were based on a transferable vote, and the Assembly elections were on a form of PR. The result was that 5 parties got seats, and there was no overall control.

The thing to note is that London has been a leader on Climate Change, and has adopted many policies that the government hasn't.

## Centralisation

UK most centralised govt in Europe apart from Malta which has a population smaller than many of our cities at 400,000 people.

Central govt has a "tenant tax" which currently is taking £200m out of council housing rent, which could be used locally where people are demanding to have more council housing, run by their local authority!
