We think all these issues are linked. So it's time for a more joined up and proactive approach to technology, one

that addresses the root causes of problems and is not limited by the dogma that technology equals progress. We want to create a new politics of technology, based on bringing together the insights of different movements, and learning from each other.

We want a human-scale technology that serves real human needs, not corporate bottom lines. We want democratic control of technology. A world facing environmental meltdown and massive inequality - both caused by 200 years of industrial capitalism - needs better solutions than more dangerous techno-fixes like climate engineering.
